

Re: Well Design Quotes for Old River Basins

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends selecting Zeiders Consulting for a not to exceed amount of \$115,400 for two wells or \$90,000 for one well.

DISCUSSION:

The District obtained two permits for new wells to be drilled at the Old River Basins. Staff reached out to AECOM and Zeiders Consulting to provide quotes for well design, preparation of bid documents, bid opening, and construction management for two new wells. The quotes are summarized below.

Zeiders consulting also provided a quote for one well with the assumption that the overall cost to drill one well and equip it with a lager motor and a VFD would be much less than it would be to drill two wells using smaller motors. The Zeiders proposal includes a cost-benefit analysis for drilling and equipping one well versus two. Based on the results of the cost-benefit analysis, staff will decide which option is best for the District and proceed accordingly.

The following Task Order defines a Scope of Services and Budget for Professional Engineering Services for Kern Delta Water District related to the "Old River Recharge Ponds Well Drilling & Equipping-Collection Pipeline Project".

Scope of Services

Zeiders Consulting proposes to provide professional services – as directed by Chris Bellue for the Old River Recharge Ponds Well Drilling & Equipping-Collection Pipeline Project.

Design and Bidding:

It is assumed that there will be one bid set for the drilling and equipping of the 2 new wells and one bid set for the collector pipelines for the 2 new wells. Services will include, evaluation/pros & cons/costs of one larger well vs two smaller wells options, wellsite design/layout, well design and specifications, well and pumping equipment design, suggested routing of PG&E power, preparation of plans, specifications and bid documents (bid sheets and descriptions), bidding support and bid evaluation for the drilling and equipping bid; collector pipeline design, hydraulics and relative cost evaluation, preparation of plans, specifications and bid documents (bid sheets and descriptions), bidding support and bid evaluation for the Old River Recharge Ponds wells as requested by the District. Equipping will include security (bars and well cages if desired), shade covers (if desired), VFD's or soft-start electrical panels (whichever is desired). Refer to pictures included with proposal.

Project Management and Construction Services:

Services will include project management, construction oversight, observation, and inspection, pay request review, etc. Additional services would include subcontract services for Labor Compliance and soils compaction testing. *The budget for this part of the proposal assumes that one of the preferred local drillers/pump companies will be the successful bidder and that only modest inspection and oversight will be required. In the event that a less reliable or lessor known driller/pump company provides the winning bid, additional services and time may be required to oversee the drilling and equipping operations. That could potentially require an increase in the budget for Project Management and Construction Services.

Budget

The budget for this Task Order is **\$115,400** Billing for all work completed under this Task Order will be on a "rate sheet" basis (per the rate sheets attached). The budget would not be exceeded without prior written authorization from Kern Delta Water District.

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If it is decided to drill and equip one larger well instead of two smaller wells, a commensurate cost reduction in the costs for our services would be realized – just as the location of the well will affect the cost of the pipeline and related construction and design services. For a single larger well, the budget for the Task Order would be **\$90,000**.

AECOM Technical Services, Inc. (AECOM) is pleased to submit this proposal for engineering services to Kern Delta Water District (District).

PROJECT UNDERSTANDING

The District is currently in construction on the Old River Basins, which is a groundwater banking facility near the intersection of Old River Road and Taft Highway in Bakersfield, California. Two extraction wells are proposed for this project and well pads were included in the District's design for the facility. The District has obtained permits from Kern County Environmental Health for the wells. These permits include the depth and size of the proposed wells.

We understand that the District desires AECOM to design the two new wells, provide support during public bidding, and construction administration. The wells will include the following features:

- 1. Constant speed motors with soft starters.
- 2. Sized for a target of 3 to 4 cfs each.
- 3. SCADA is not included.








CURRENT RESERVOIR CONDITIONS




Isabella Lake Conditions






Tulare Basin 6-Station



6-10 Day Temperature Outlook








6-10 Day Precipitation Outlook








8-14 Day Temperature Outlook



RE: Report of Recent Activities

This is the August 10, 2023, Kern River Watermaster Report.

Isabella Dam Safety Modification Project – The COE Isabella Situation Report has not been produced since the May 2023 issue.

The Kern River Group met with the COE on a weekly basis through August 2nd to receive an update on the Project, Reservoir conditions, Fill Plan, and Draw Down Plan. The weekly meetings have been terminated and we will meet as needed. The Kern River Interests are managing Isabella outflows to reduce storage and prepare for winter carryover.

Runoff and Operations – Runoff ramped up to approximately 9000 cfs July 3rd and 4th due to high temperatures and is currently just under 2000 cfs. The inflows continue to drop as the snow melt season is ending. Isabella is currently at 514,000 acre-fee (see attached Current Reservoir Conditions August 9 attached). The Storage peak of 550,420 acre-feet was met on July 26th. Attached is the August 9, 2023, Tulare Basin Precipitation 6-Station Index for water year 2023. With no precipitation over the past several months, the Index remained steady at 51.4 inches of precipitation, 183% percent of average for this date compared to the water year. Also attached is the August 9th Tulare Basin 6-Station Precipitation Bar Chart showing the same information in a monthly format. The July 31st California Snow Water Content (copy attached) shows the southern Sierra at 0% of the April 1st average and 0% of average for this date. I have also attached a the August 10th Midnight Lake Isabella Storage and Pool Restrictions graph showing current storage conditions relating to the USACE Operations Manual for Isabella. Although storage is within the allowed space at this time, we may not be able to stay within allowable space. The Kern River Interests made a request to encroach into winter carryover space and for carryover storage to exceed the 170,000 acre-feet up to 245,000 acre-feet during the rain flood season (November 1, 2023 to February 1, 2024) in Isabella Reservoir. The USACE is reviewing our request.

A few important dates at a glance from the past few months:

May 4th – Mandatory Release Order from USACE of 7500 cfs of Outflow

May 20th – Kern River Intertie Operations Began

May 20th – Kern River Notice Order is Distributed

June 12th – Kern River Intertie Operations Cease with Approximately 24,000 acre-feet Delivered

June 12th – Kern River Notice Order is Canceled

June 16th – Request from USACE to Average 4600 cfs of Outflow

July 12th – Request from Kern River Interests to Average 3800 cfs Outflow

July 26th – Peak Storage in Isabella = 550,420 acre-feet

August 2nd – Kern River Interests Request to Exceed Winter Carryover Storage

I participated in a final call with representatives from DWR and USACE regarding this year's operation of the Kern River Intertie operations on a weekly basis during its operation. Improvements for future operations were discussed.

Public Outreach – The public continues to request information and updates regarding Kern River flows and forecasts. I communicated with all four television stations in town, the Bakersfield Californian, and SJV Water this month. I made presentations to the NOR Chamber of Commerce on July 13th and the Water Association of Kern County July 25th. I am scheduled to talk at the September 20 local branch of the ASCE.

California Cooperative Snow Surveys – The ground snow surveys for 2023 have ceased.



Please consider this correspondence as notice of the PGSA's Intent to Amend its GSP, pursuant to California Water Code section 10728.4., which provides: A groundwater sustainability agency may adopt or amend a groundwater sustainability plan after a public hearing, held at least 90 days after providing notice to a city or county within the area of the proposed plan or amendment. The groundwater sustainability agency shall review and consider comments from any city or county that receives notice pursuant to this section and shall consult with a city or county that requests consultation within 30 days of receipt of the notice. Nothing in this section is intended to preclude an agency and a city or county from otherwise consulting or commenting regarding the adoption or amendment of a plan.













Summary: The California Environmental Quality Act requires a lead agency to prepare a mitigated negative declaration for a project that may have a significant effect on the environment if revisions in the project would avoid or mitigate that effect and there is no substantial evidence that the project, as revised, would have a significant effect on the environment. CEQA establishes a procedure by which a person may seek judicial review of the decision of the lead agency made pursuant to CEQA. This bill

would require the Judicial Council to adopt rules of court applicable to actions or proceedings brought to attack, review, set aside, void, or annul the certification or adoption of an environmental impact report for specified water projects, as defined, or the granting of any project approvals, including any appeals to the court of appeal or the Supreme Court, to be resolved, to the extent feasible, within 270 days of the filing of the certified record of proceedings with the court to an action or proceeding seeking judicial review of the lead agency's action related to those projects. The bill would require the lead agency to prepare the record of proceedings for a project, as provided, and to include a specified notice in the draft EIR and final EIR for the project.
