President Palla called to order the Regular Session of the Kern Delta Board of Directors at 1:00PM.

#### II. CONSENT CALENDAR

M/S/C (Spitzer/Kaiser) (yes-6, no-0): By unanimous vote, with Directors Antongiovanni, Tillema, and Fanucchi absent, the Board approved and authorized items II A through II C of the Consent Calendar.

- A. Approval of Minutes from the Regular Board Meeting of August 1, 2023.
- B. Approval of the July/August District Construction and Water Banking Project(s) Disbursements.
- C. Approval of the July/August District Disbursements.

#### III. BUSINESS AND FINANCE

- A. <u>Business & Finance Committee Report August 10, 2023:</u> District Controller Duncan provided a report from the August Business & Finance Committee Meeting.
- A(i). Review and Acceptance of FY 2022 Audit Report Brown Armstrong: Lindsey Zimmerman with Brown Armstrong Certified Public Accountants provided an overview presentation of the Independent Auditor's Report for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2022. Mrs. Zimmerman conveyed that the audit process resulted in a clean audit report of the District's financial position in all material respects. In addition, there were no audit findings or issues identified. During the course of the presentation, it was noted that there may be a typographical error on page 12 and 29 of the report. Mrs. Zimmerman identified the error and agreed to provide corrected copies to the District (which occurred shortly after the Board meeting).
- M/S/C (Spitzer/Kaiser (yes-6, no-0): By unanimous vote, with Directors Antongiovanni, Tillema, and Fanucchi absent, the Board accepted the FY 2022 Audit Report from Brown Armstrong including identified corrections to pages 12 & 29 of the report.
- A(ii). <u>Approval of August 2023 Financial Reports:</u> Mr. Duncan presented the August 2023 District and Water Banking Project(s) Financial Statements, Treasurer's Reports, and District Delinquency Report.

M/S/C (Garone/Mendonca (yes-6, no-0): By unanimous vote, with Directors Antongiovanni, Tillema, and Fanucchi absent, the Board approved the June 2023 District and Water Banking Project(s) Financial Statements, Treasurer's Reports, and Delinquency Report as presented.

#### IV. OPERATIONS AND PROJECTS

A. - A(i-iv). Operations and Projects Committee – August 1, 2023: Assistant General Manager Bellue briefly reported on several items. Mr. Bellue's update included District maintenance activities, recent encroachment permit requests, pending development projects impacting District facilities, and a status update related to the Old River and Sunset Groundwater Banking projects.

B. Review and Approval of a Task Order with Zeiders Consulting for Professional Engineering Services for the Old River Recharge Ponds Well Drilling & Equipping-Collection Pipeline Project, in an amount not to exceed \$115,400. Approval Recommended by the Operations & Projects Committee (Kern Delta Banking Project): Staff provided a brief overview of the intent of this project, which is to conduct an analysis of the cost/benefit of the development of either one or two wells for the Old River Recharge Ponds. In addition, once the analysis is completed the scope of work includes design, preparation of bid documents, and construction management services for the project.

M/S/C (Mendonca/Borba (yes-6, no-0): By unanimous vote, with Directors Antongiovanni, Tillema, and Fanucchi absent, the Board approved the Task Order with Zeiders Consulting as presented, in an amount not to exceed \$115,400.

C. Acceptance of Quitclaim Deed for APN: 371-411-09 (Branch 1 Canal): Staff recommended the Board authorize the General Manager to accept the Quitclaim Deed of a parcel located on the southwest corner of Harris Road and Wible Road which contains a portion of the Branch 1 Canal. The current property owner has offered to relinquish ownership of the parcel to the District as it is fully occupied by the Branch 1 Canal.

M/S/C (Borba/Mendonca (yes-6, no-0): By unanimous vote, with Directors Antongiovanni, Tillema, and Fanucchi absent, the Board approved the acceptance of the Quitclaim Deed for APN: 371-411-09 and authorized the General Manager to execute the necessary documents.

#### V. WATER RESOURCES REPORT

- A. A(i-iii). <u>District Watermaster Report:</u> Staff reviewed and discussed the water supplies of the District for the month of July and early August. Approximately 48,772 acre-feet of water was diverted in District during July. Staff also provided information related to current precipitation totals and future forecasts. It was also noted that the SWP allocation increased to 100%. The April through July Kern River runoff forecast, as provided in the Department of Water Resources B120 report, was 382% (350% for the Water Year). Staff also highlighted that the District will be purchasing 10,000af of water from the City of Bakersfield in August.
- B. B(i). <u>Kern River Watermaster Report:</u> The August Kern River Watermaster Report and Isabella construction update was included in the Board packet. In addition, Mark Mulkay, the Kern River Watermaster provided a brief verbal update.
- C. <u>District Groundwater Manager Report:</u> Groundwater Manager Marquez provided graphical information regarding depth to groundwater at various monitoring locations throughout the District.

#### VI. MANAGER'S REPORT

- A. A(i). General Manager Teglia provided a brief verbal report regarding local SGMA activities; noted the upcoming ACWA fall conference scheduled for November 28<sup>th</sup>-30<sup>th</sup>, and a brief update on future meeting schedules.
- B. External Agency Report: Mr. Teglia provided verbal comments supplementing a memorandum included in the Board package which provided information on the meetings and activities of various external agencies. These agencies include, but are not limited to, the Kern County Water Agency (including the status of the Delta Conveyance Project and Contract Extension), Kern Fan Authority, Kern River Watershed Coalition Authority, Kern Groundwater Authority, Kern River Groundwater Sustainability Agency, the South Valley Water Resources Authority, the Water Association of Kern County, and the Integrated Regional Water Management Plan.

C. <u>Water Banking Projects Report:</u> Mr. Teglia provided verbal comments supplementing a memorandum included in the Board package which provided information on water banking project activity on the Kern Fan as well as District banking activities.

#### VII. <u>ATTORNEY'S REPORT</u>

B. <u>2023 District Election Update:</u> Mr. Iger provided a brief update regarding the District election calendar. It was noted that given there are no challengers to the incumbent Directors, there will be no need for a District election and all incumbents will be reappointed.

C. <u>VAWC Legislative Update:</u> Mr. Iger provided the Board with a brief legislative update, including a reference to the VAWC Legislative Update which was included in the Board packet.

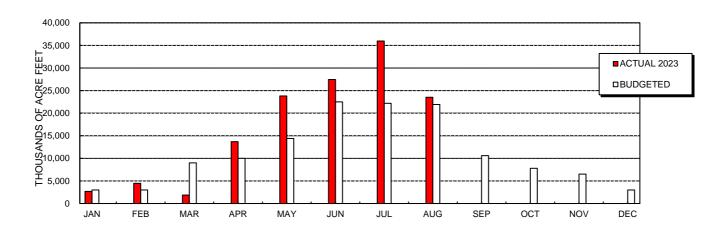

# NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING RE DECLARATION OF NECESSITY OF LEVYING SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS

WHEREAS, California Water Code §§ 35539 – 35539.4 establishes a procedure whereby this District may levy a special assessment of an equal amount upon each acre of developed land, upon each acre of undeveloped land, or both, within the District or within zones established pursuant to Resolution No. 82-08 in accordance with Water Code Sections 35534 and 35535, in order to cause just and equitable sharing among the District's landowners of all or any portion of District obligations for the next year in excess of receipts from water charges as reflected in the annual estimate of obligations; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Directors finds and determines that it is necessary to collect by special assessment the approximate sum of \$488,250.41 in order to meet a portion of the estimated obligations of the District during 2024 attributable to general administration of the District, the approximate sum of \$95,625.09 in order to meet a portion of the estimated obligations of the District during 2024 attributable to general benefits of District's participation in the California State Water Project, and the approximate sum of \$397,611.87 in order to meet a portion of the estimated obligations of the District during 2024 attributable to specific benefits of District's participation in the California State Water Project; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED by this Board of Directors as follows:

- 1. That all the foregoing is true and correct.
- 2. That it is necessary to levy a special assessment in the amount of \$4.34 upon each acre of developed and undeveloped land within the District in order to cause just and equitable sharing among the District's landowners of the portion of the District's obligations for 2024 in excess of receipts from water charges attributable to general administration of the District.
- 3. That it is necessary to levy a special assessment in the amount of \$0.85 upon each acre of developed and undeveloped land within the District in order to cause just and equitable sharing among the District's landowners of the portion of the District's obligations for 2024 in excess of receipts from water charges attributable to general benefits of District participation in the California State Water Project.
- 4. That it is necessary to levy a special assessment in the amounts described below upon each acre of land within the Kern Delta Water District Zone Numbers 1 through 11, as described below, in order to cause just and equitable sharing among the District landowners of the portion of the District's obligations for 2024 in excess of receipts from water charges attributable to specific benefits of District's participation in the California State Water Project, to wit (unchanged from calendar year 2023):
  - (a) Zone No. 1 \$2.12 per acre

(c) Zone No. 3 - \$3.82 per acre

(b) Zone No. 2 - \$1.36 per acre

(d) Zone No. 4 - \$4.63 per acre

RE: Report of Recent Activities

This is the September 12, 2023, Kern River Watermaster Report. As you are all aware, this will be my last Watermaster Report. My time is coming to an end as the Kern River Watermaster and Art Chianello will assume the position on October 1, 2023. I wish to express my thanks and gratitude to each of you. It has been a pleasure and joy working with all of you the past two years and 2023 was an extraordinary year. Thanks for your support and friendship. Even through all the stress of 2023, your professionalism was appreciated. Good luck and may the water gods be kind to you all. I will be watching your progress from a distance, but my heart will always beat to the Kern River currents.

**Isabella Dam Safety Modification Project** – The Kern River Interests are managing Isabella outflows to reduce storage and prepare for winter carryover. Isabella Dam Safety Requirements continue to be monitored by the USACE.

Runoff and Operations – Runoff has slowed to approximately 1000 cfs. The inflows continue to slowly drop as the end of water year 2023 approaches. Isabella is currently at 423,925 acre-fee (see attached Current Reservoir Conditions September 12 attached) as we reduce to the winter carryover. Attached is the September 11, 2023, Tulare Basin Precipitation 6-Station Index for water year 2023. With the only precipitation over the past several months coming from Hurricane Hilary, the Index increased three inches to 54.4 inches of precipitation, 193% percent of average for this date compared to the water year. Also attached is the September 11th Tulare Basin 6-Station Precipitation Bar Chart showing the same information in a monthly format. The July 31st California Snow Water Content (copy attached) shows the southern Sierra at 0% of the April 1st average and 0% of average for this date. I have also attached the September 12th Midnight Lake Isabella Storage and Pool Restrictions graph showing current storage conditions relating to the USACE Operations Manual for Isabella. Although storage is just outside the allowed space at this time, we are following the drawdown line and the USACE has not given any directions to increase outflow at this time. As of September 6th, the USACE approved a request from the Kern River Interests to allow for greater winter carryover. After evaluating the request and current dam safety requirements, the USACE approved an additional carryover volume of 41,000 ac-ft (total of 211,000 ac-ft) for the water year 2024 with a target date of November 15th. The Kern River Interests agreed to increase outflows to evacuate this 41,000 ac-ft in the event of a near term large storm prediction.

May 20<sup>th</sup> – Kern River Intertie Operations Began

May 20<sup>th</sup> – Kern River Notice Order is Distributed

June 12<sup>th</sup> – Kern River Intertie Operations Cease with Approximately 24,000 acre-feet Delivered

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June 12<sup>th</sup> – Kern River Notice Order is Canceled
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June 16<sup>th</sup> – Request from USACE to Average 4600 cfs of Outflow

July 12<sup>th</sup> – Request from Kern River Interests to Average 3800 cfs Outflow

July 25<sup>th</sup> – Peak Storage in Isabella = 550,543 acre-feet, Elevation = 2603.95 feet

August 2<sup>nd</sup> – Kern River Interests Request to Exceed Winter Carryover Storage

August 20<sup>th</sup> – Isabella Storage = 485,702 acre-feet prior to Hurricane Hilary

August 23<sup>rd</sup> – Isabella Storage = 498,861 acre-feet after Hurricane Hilary

September 6<sup>th</sup> – USACE Approved 41,000 acre-feet of Additional Winter Carryover

October 1<sup>st</sup> – Art Chianello Begins as the Kern River Watermaster

I will participate in a few meetings between now and the end of the year:

September 13<sup>th</sup> – Isabella Partners Repair Discussion (Power Plant at the base of Isabella Dam)

September 21st – California Cooperators Snow Survey Meeting

December 6<sup>th</sup> – WY 2024 Reservoir Operator Training Isabella Dam (I will support Art)

**Public Outreach** – The public has been requesting information and updates regarding Kern River flows and the draw down of Isabella Reservoir for winter carryover. I am scheduled to talk at the September 20 local branch of the ASCE and participate in the filming (September 25<sup>th</sup>) of the Kern County Water Agency's review of 2023.

# 2022 Crop Report

Kern Delta Water District delivers Kern River and State water to approximately 90,000 acres of irrigated agricultural land within its boundaries covered by six service areas: Kern Island, Buena Vista, Stine, Farmers, Eastside, and State. In the 2022 growing season, 149,706 acres of land was cultivated (multiple cropping included) and approximately 13,697 acres of land was idle either due to crop rotation or conversion to permanent crops such as almonds. Table 1 summarizes the cropped acres within each of Kern Delta Water District's service areas<sup>1</sup>.

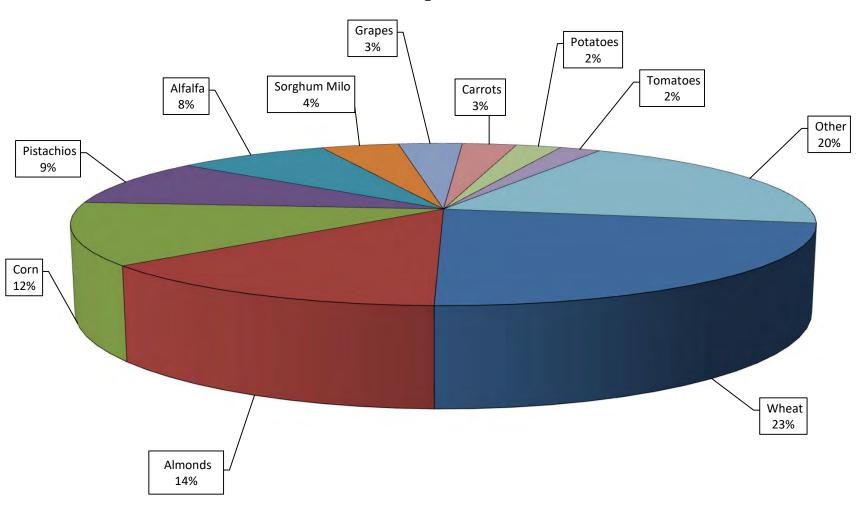

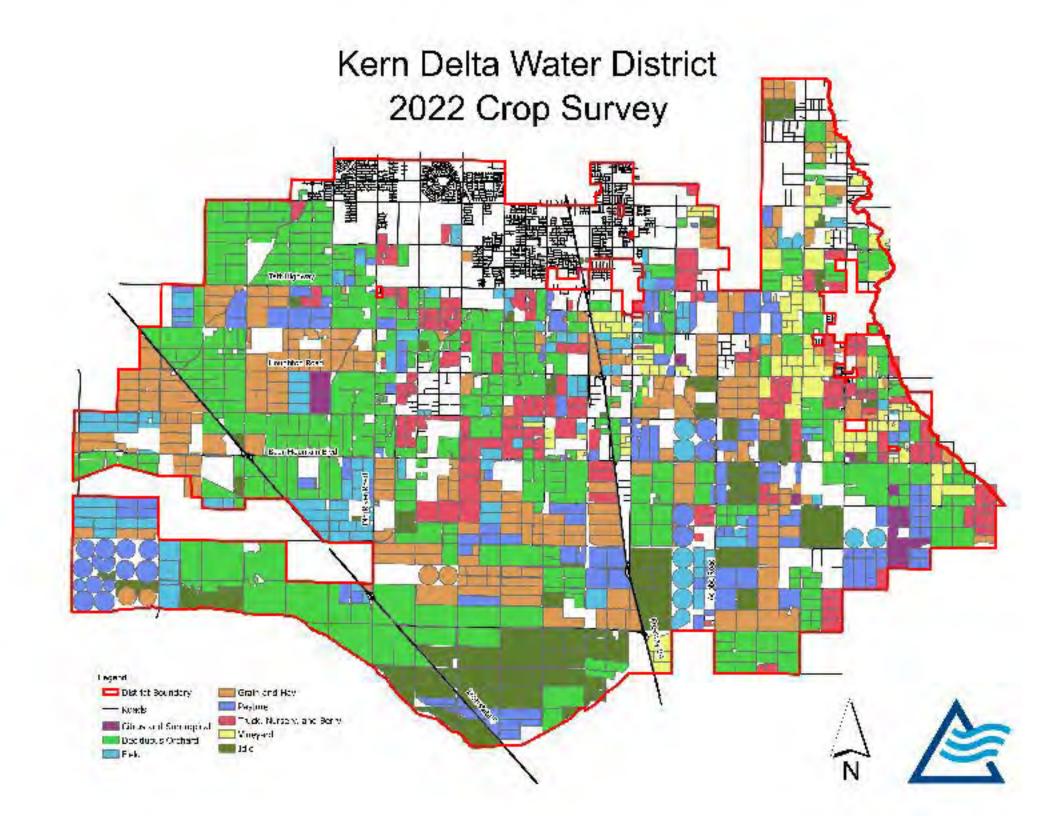


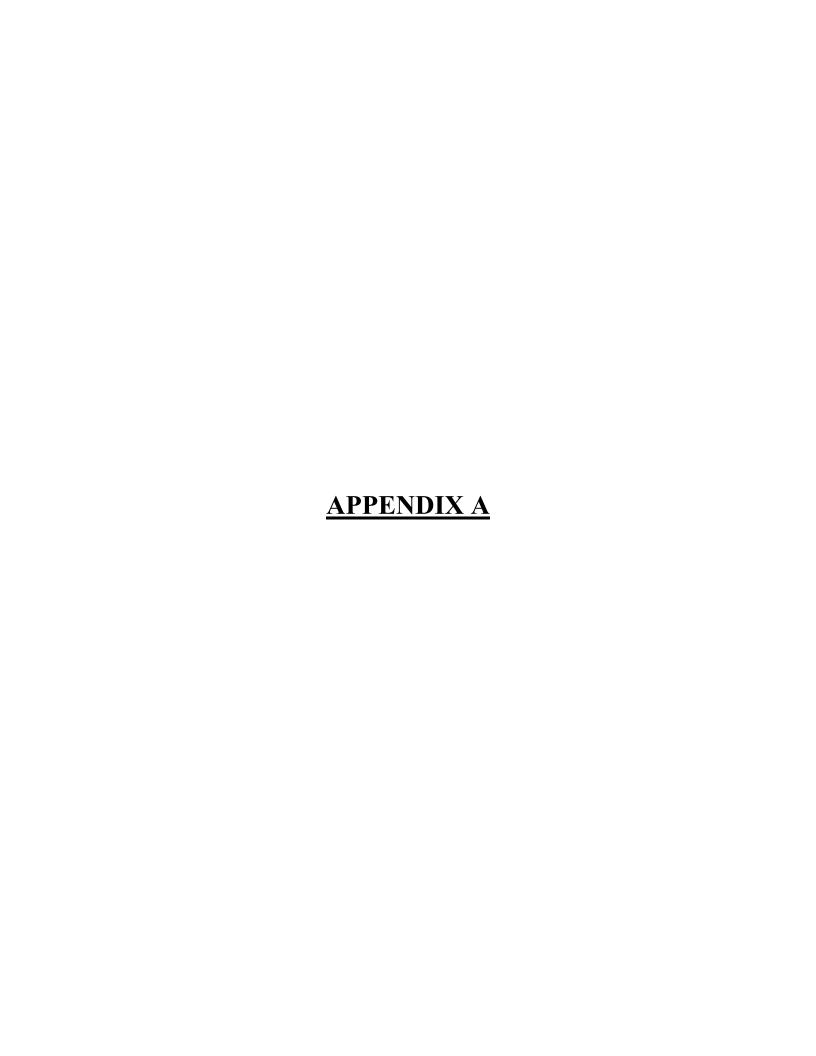
# Kern Delta Water District 2022 Crop Production



# **General Crop Trends Over Time**



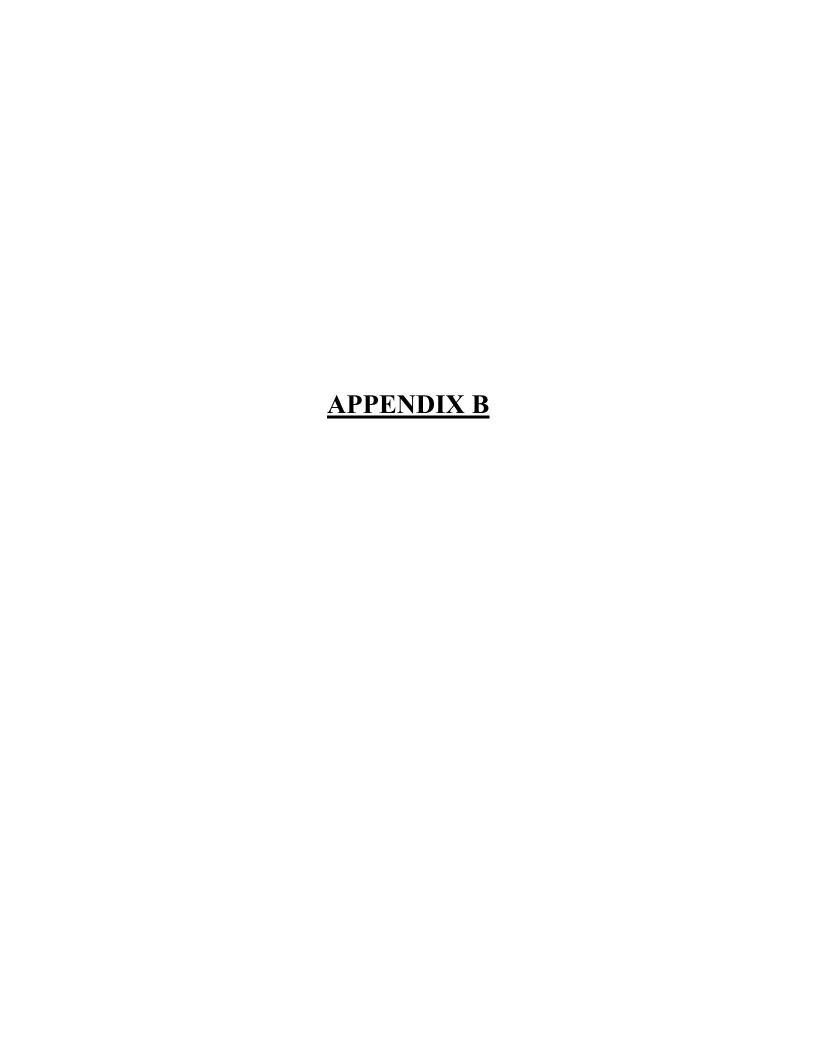

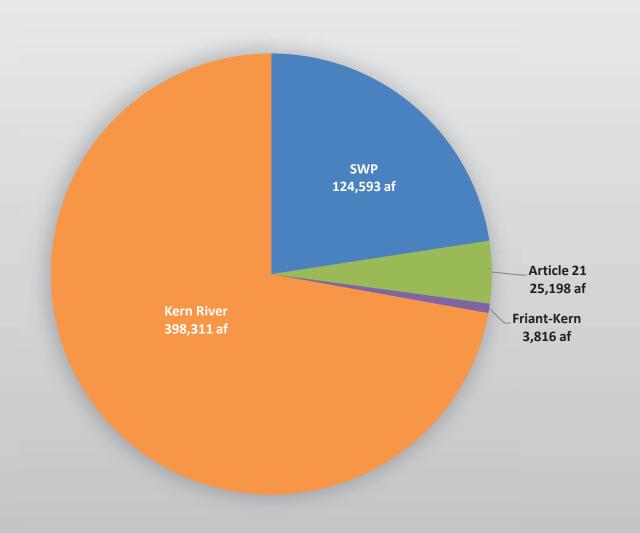

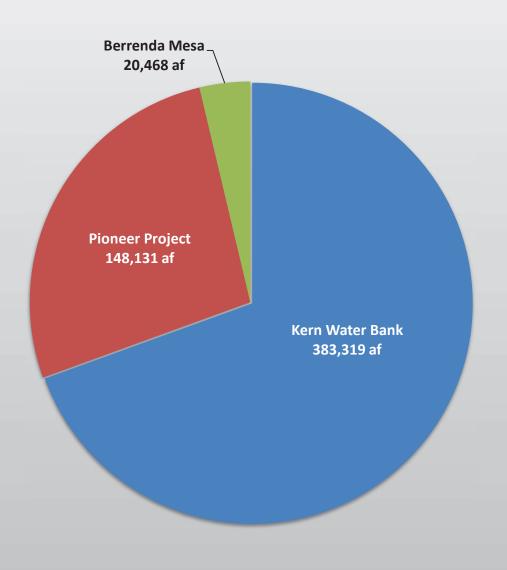

## 2023 Estimated Kern Fan Banking Project Deliveries (by Water Type) Deliveries through July 31, 2023 Total Deliveries 551,918 af

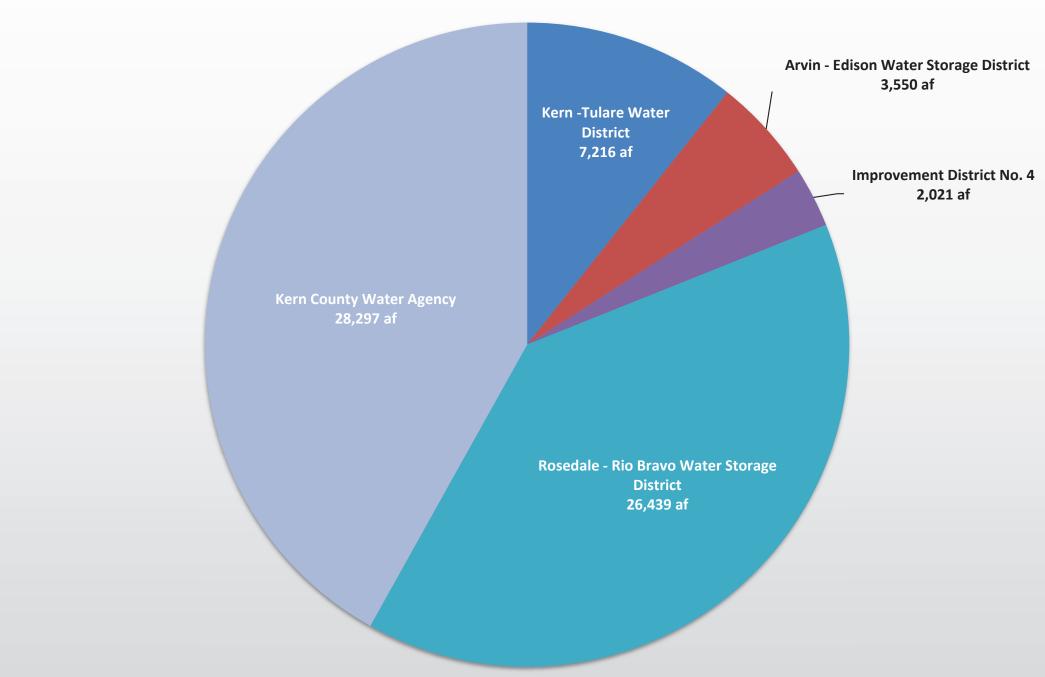


## 2023 Estimated Kern Fan Banking Project Deliveries (by Project)

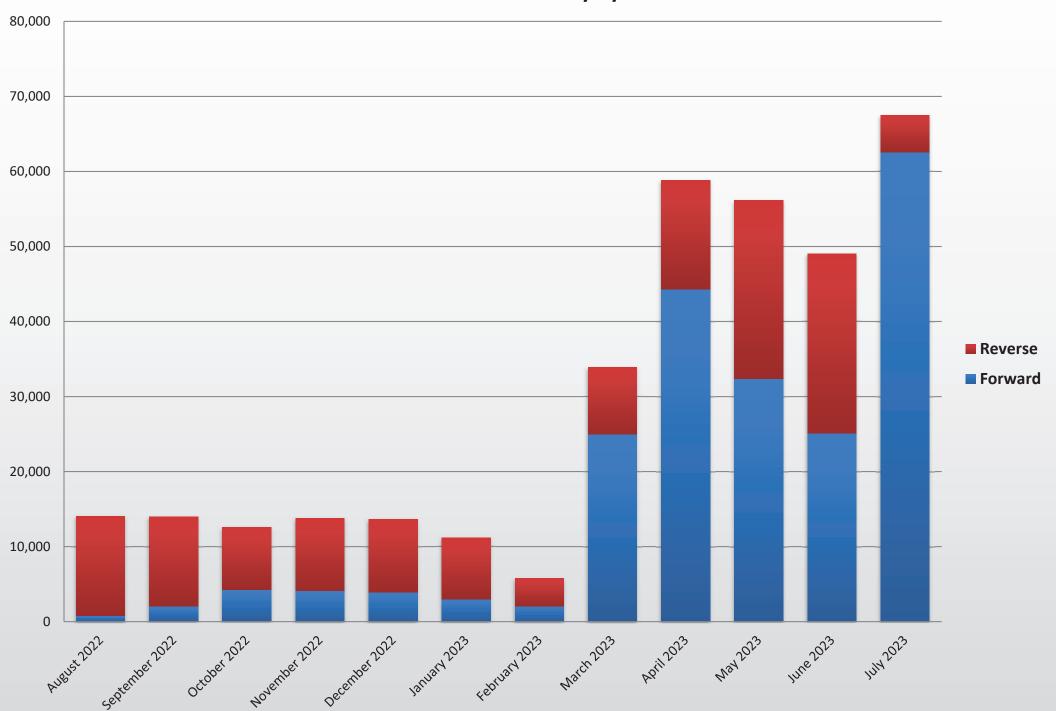

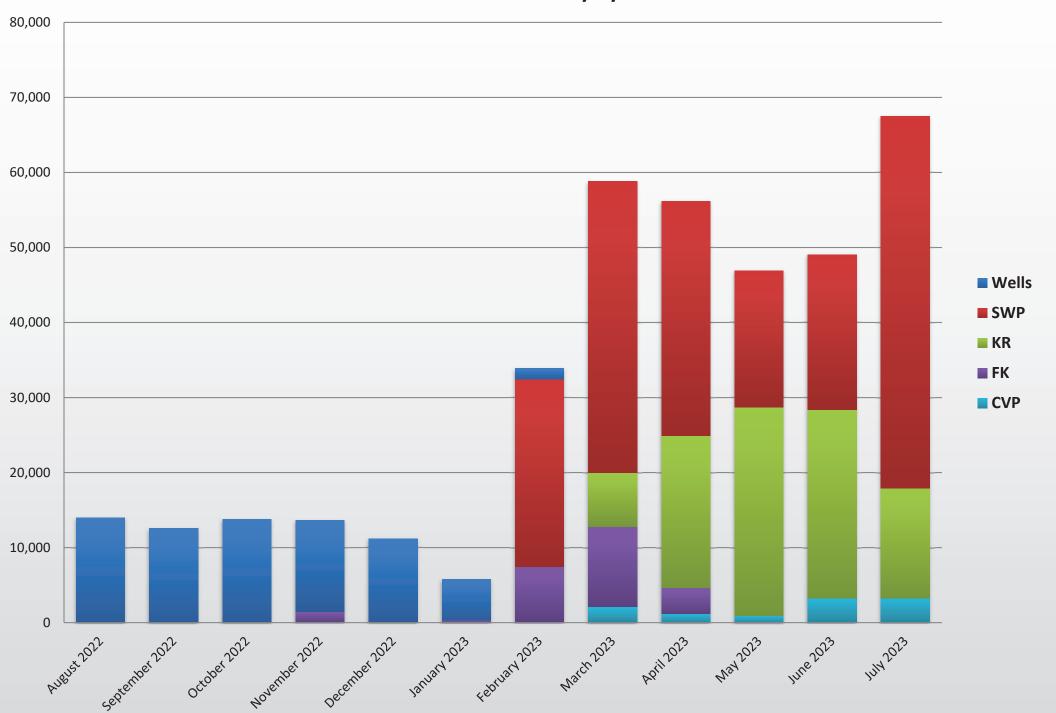
### Cross Valley Canal July 2023 Deliveries Total deliveries 67,523 af

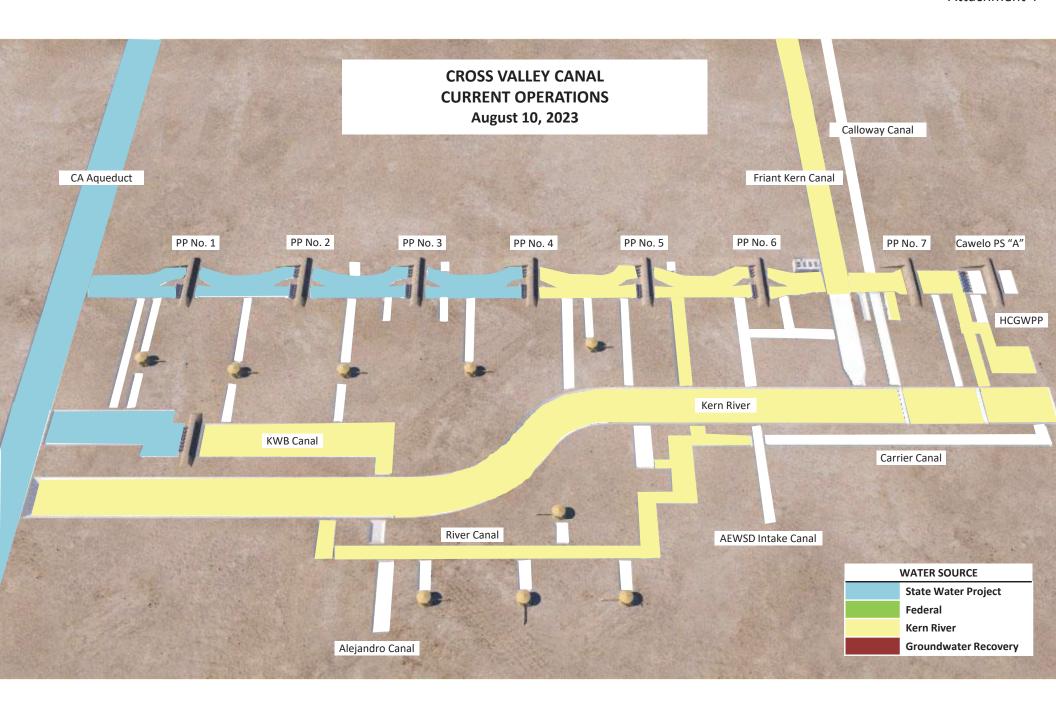


## Cross Valley Canal Twelve Month Delivery by Direction

Summary: The California Environmental Quality Act requires a lead agency to prepare a mitigated

negative declaration for a project that may have a significant effect on the environment if revisions in the project would avoid or mitigate that effect and there is no substantial evidence that the project, as revised, would have a significant effect on the environment. CEQA establishes a procedure by which a person may seek judicial review of the decision of the lead agency made pursuant to CEQA. This bill would require the Judicial Council to adopt rules of court applicable to actions or proceedings brought to attack, review, set aside, void, or annul the certification or adoption of an environmental impact report for specified water projects, as defined, or the granting of any project approvals, including any appeals to the court of appeal or the Supreme Court, to be resolved, to the extent feasible, within 270 days of the filing of the certified record of proceedings with the court to an action or proceeding seeking judicial review of the lead agency's action related to those projects. The bill would require the lead agency to prepare the record of proceedings for a project, as provided, and to include a specified notice in the draft EIR and final EIR for the project.
